This book aims to contribute to the process of community bridge building and human understanding through these uplifting and illuminating reflections.

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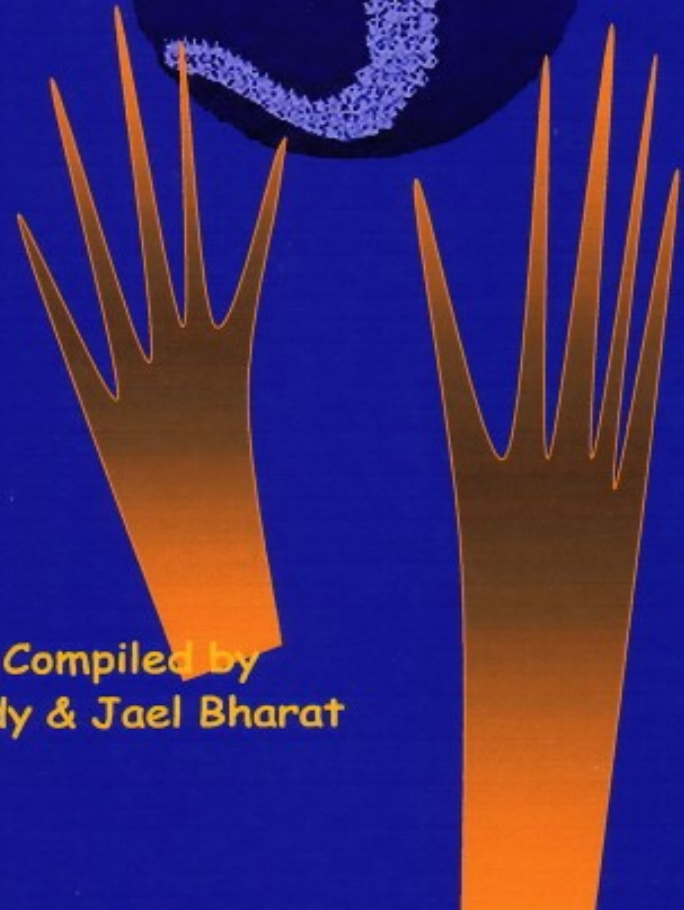

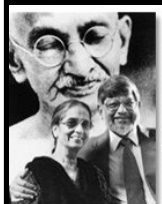
